# Gloucester Nursery School Newsletter February 2023

#### Dear Parents/Carers,

Welcome back to the nursery! I hope everyone had a good week. This is the last newsletter letter I will be producing for the nursery......I will be leaving the nursery after 18 years as the Headteacher at the end of the term. I have enjoyed being part of the team, making Gloucester Nursery such an amazing place for young children and their families. I am sure you will welcome the new Headteacher, Lisa Jeffery after the Easter holidays.

A new child will be joining the G2 provision from February. Although this half term is quite short we have lots of exciting things planning for the children: E.g. Piper our artist in residence will be working on projects with G3 children, watching chicks hatch out of eggs, World Book Day, Red Nose Day, an Easter Celebration Stay and Play Day and a Mini Farm Visit.

#### **Children's Learning**

#### Children in the 2 year provision (G2)

World Book Day – Thursday March 2<sup>nd</sup>. Do you and your child read together each day? There are some wonderful YouTube stories being read, why not have a look?

The children will have storybooks read to them each day and the staff will also be using picture books to support the development of language. If your child has a particular favourite book please use Tapestry to share this with the staff.

Adults will be inspiring and supporting children's pretend play by setting up a wonderful bakery, which was suggested by some of the children. The children will be hunting for eggs in the garden.

#### Parents and Children - Things to do together

Things to do to support your child's learning

- Before washing hands encourage your child to practice rolling up their sleeves and when getting dressed; pushing their feet into open socks. This will help develop their independence
- Practice using a spoon to mix, scoop and eat food such as yogurt and cereal
- Help to get lunch ready by chopping and spreading
- Help you around the home e.g. dusting, putting items in the bin, wiping tables
- Playing guessing games by placing items inside boxes or underneath material, with adults using language/questions e.g. "What's inside?" Encourage the children to have a guess or use their senses to find out.

#### **Children's Learning**

#### Children in G3:

This term, the children will be learning about growth, animals, change and shapes and patterns.

All the children in G3 will enjoy taking part in World Book Day on Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> March.

Research from the National Literacy Trust shows that when parents are involved in their children's literacy development it makes a huge difference to their success at school and in later life.

Children in G3 will be looking at similarities and differences, materials (what things are made out of and recycling), time and space.



Children in G2 and G3: OUTDOOR LEARNING

Did you know the expectation for young children is to have 180 minutes of physical exercise every day? 1 in 5 primary school children are obese.

All the children follow the Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum. The expectation within the curriculum is for children to access indoor and outdoor learning every day. Young children need to be physically active. The weather is still cold, please help your child to continue experiencing the outside curriculum by ensuring they bring suitable clothing and footwear.

**Early Reading tips:** When our children are very young there is a lot we can do to include them in the world of reading. We can aim to build up motivation so that our children **WANT** to learn to read. Why not try some of the following...

- Talk, talk, talk We know that talking helps reading! Encourage your child to be a chatterbox!
- © Parents who read It's vital that children understand that reading is something adults do. If your child sees that you value books and enjoy reading, then they will want to have a go themselves.
- A special time for sharing books regularly reading books to a child is the best way to involve them in the world of reading.
- © Follow your child's interests: Choose books carefully.
- © Songs and Nursery rhymes these are great for building pre-reading skills, such as memorising.
- © Signs and Labels around us: Involve your child as you read simple print around you. Point out signs and labels and read birthday cards and text messages aloud so that your child understands that print carries meaning.
- Talk about the text: Whether it be a book, comic or eBook talk about it before sharing and ask your child to talk about what is happening, what they can see and invite them to begin to think about what might happen next.

Please try not to focus too much on trying to teach your child particular reading skills during the early stages, just enjoy sharing and discussing texts together. Obviously your children will progress at different levels, so if you would like more advice on the next steps for your child please ask a member of staff or contact me.

#### 3 and 4 year olds only: Parents and Children - Things to do

#### Personal and Social:

Talk, talk, talk! Please help your child to resolve conflicts with other children by themselves, giving guidance when needed. Children need to be able to say to another child when they do something that makes them sad.

Encourage listening to each other and carrying on play by responding to what they hear around them.

Encourage children to be as independent as possible and to concentrate and complete an activity that they have started.

#### Maths:

Looking at and looking for 2-D shapes indoors and out (square, triangle, rectangle, circle, semi-circle, diamond, star etc). Using mathematical language to describe shapes E.g. straight, edges, corners, curved. Can you find any 3-D shapes?

Looking at patterns in the environment and copying a pattern.

Counting amounts and recognising numbers to 10, 20 and beyond! Children



#### Some more tips to encourage talking:

We encourage the use of Tapestry to help children talk and recall what they have experienced outside of Nursery. What they did at the weekend, any places they visited, celebrations they had.

We are becoming fabulous story tellers! Can the children tell you a bedtime story using pictures from a book? Can they draw a picture and tell you a story that you write down for them?

#### **Reading and Writing**

We are always practising writing our names... we put it on all the work we do.

Could you help your child listen carefully for the beginning sounds in words and have a go at writing down the letter?

Make sure the children are trying to hold their pencil correctly.

Learn the alphabet song and play 'I spy.'

General Information for all parents and carers.

Safeguarding children is everyone's responsibility.

#### Please can parents:


## The red bullet points are very important

#### **Collecting Children:**

Please notify us if someone other than a parent/carer is collecting a child on any day. Children under the age of 16 are not allowed to collect children. At pick up times, a Family Worker will 'hand your child over to you' and if information needs to be passed on they will do so.

In the unlikely event that the Nursery is closed (e.g severe weather conditions) the closure will be communicated to you via Parent Mail. Please do not phone the Nursery.

Please check your emails regularly.

#### IF YOU CHILD IS FEELING UNWELL

Keep your child at home until they are fully recovered. Young children are always 'on the go' therefore children need to be fit and active at nursery. Germs spread very easily with young children! Please phone the nursery if your child is unable to attend.

**Tapestry** – Staff are sending observations of your child's learning. Are you enjoying reading them and sending us information?
